# BTRR OVERVIEW



Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) created the National Observance in 1989.

For more than 30 years, during the month of September, communities, and local organizations from across the country host celebrations in honor of the National Recovery Month observation. These activities take many forms that bring public attention to recovery and challenge negative attitudes, stigma, and discrimination.


The Recovery Month observance reminds us that when we share our personal accomplishments and struggles, we combat the stigmas that can impede the recovery journey and send a message to positively impact lives for the better.



For more than a decade, a vital part of this tradition has included the Big Texas Rally for Recovery (BTRR)—a celebration for recovery of individuals, families, and entire communities across Texas.

Rallies aim to increase understanding of substance use and mental health challenges and encourage others to achieve recovery. Meeting people where they are and showing non-judgmental support can be the critical factor for a person to accept evidence-based treatment and supports. Positive messaging, tools, and supportive platforms can encourage healthy choices, and help those in need find support or help.

This impact report is intended to showcase the celebrations that occurred in September 2024 all across Texas.





### 2011

Beginning in 2011, the recovery community in Texas began to band together to represent the interests of people in recovery and to mobilize. Funded by a private donor from a Recovery Oriented System of Care (ROSC) meeting.

### 2011-2021

BTRR occurred in one city. All of the Texas recovery communities were invited to travel and attend the rally. Over the years, host cities moved around from Dallas, Austin, Houston, and San Antonio.

### 2022

A planning committee decided that it would be beneficial to host multiple rallies in individual communities to increase participation and provide local resources. The five rally cities include Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Midland, and San Antonio.

### 2023

The Addiction Research Institute (ARI) was granted the coordination of events and HHS sponsorship funds to support local rallies. Ten rallies occurred in Abilene, Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Lufkin, Midland, San Antonio, San Marcos, and Tyler.

### 2024

The Addiction Research Institute (ARI) sponsored sixteen BTRR Affiliates to host rallies throughout Texas for September 2024.



Rally stages came alive with inspiring stories from individuals sharing their recovery journeys, city officials, local celebrities, and talented bands...



# **ATTENDANCE**

From small towns to bustling cities, communities across Texas came together in an incredible show of support, enjoying a spectacular turnout.

Highlights estimated attendance figures for each city, showcasing the impressive engagement at these events. In total, approximately 9,966 Texans participated in rallies statewide in 2024—what an amazing milestone!

### IT ALL STARTED WITH A PHONE CALL.

Trisha Bos, a Recovery Support Peer Specialist from Abilene Recovery Council, picked up the phone to contact TDCJ to discuss peer reentry work in Texas. Ms. Bos spoke with Ms. Riley, Peer Support Program Supervisor at TDCJ, who explained the need for recovery celebrations within correctional settings she works in. Ms. Bos brought together a planning committee of 12 people across a variety of systems, organizations, and backgrounds to host the first BTRR within TDCJ Correctional Facility. On September 21st, 10 people most of who have lived experience as a Recovery Support Peer Specialists, facilitated the first BTRR at Lane Murray Unit in Gatesville, TX. They shared peer support education and data, recovery resources, such as ROSC, and personal recovery stories to over 120 women in the recovery housing. With much success, the planning committee was welcomed back! On October 19th, the team facilitated the 2nd TDCJ BTRR at the Hughes Men's Unit in Gatesville, TX to over 175 men in recovery housing. This opportunity has grown into a wonderful collaboration across systems with the goals to continue to inspire hope for recovery and connect individuals to recovery resources and communities when they return home from TDCJ.
